





Total Crime 10 Year Trend












Homicide 10 Year Trend






Homicide Unit January - December 2024







Violent Crime 10 Year Trend















School Resource Officer Program



August 26, 2024 the Fayetteville Police Department assumed control of 49 Cumberland County Schools located within the city limits

Currently have 11 certified SRO's in the schools

Currently have 64 Part Time Traffic Control Officer positions assigned to schools.

Officers have responded to 946 calls for service

Officers have documented 220 incident reports

Based on current month average the schools are expected to generate over 2,000 calls for service and add nearly 500 new crimes during the calendar school year 2024-2025










January – December 2024 TSR MAP





Traffic Stop 10 Year Trend






TSR Data Total Stops 2024








Search Rates Black Drivers 2024






FAYETTEVILLE: Search Rates White Drivers 2024

INCREASED COMMUNITY ADVOCACY

Accreditation embodies the precepts of community-oriented policing. It creates a forum in which law enforcement agencies and citizens work together to prevent and control challenges confronting law enforcement and provides clear direction about community expectations.



STAUNCH SUPPORT **OFFICIALS**

Accreditation provides objective evidence of an agency's commitment to excellence in leadership, resource Thus, government officials are more confident in the agency's ability to operate efficiently and meet community needs.

STRONGER DEFENSE **AGAINST** CIVIL **LAWSUITS**

Accredited agencies are better able to defend themselves against civil lawsuits. Also, many agencies report a decline in legal actions against

them, once they become accredited.

CALEA standards since 1986, saved the department from paying outrageous monetary damages to a convicted felon, turned plaintiff. This is just one more reason, the MCSO will continue to comply with the CALEA accreditation standards and encourage other agencies









