




### 2025 Homicide





## Calls for Service / Report Comparison



August 26, 2024, the Fayetteville Police Department assumed control of 49 Cumberland County Schools located within the city limits.

Currently have 18 certified SRO's in the schools.

Currently have 66 Part Time Traffic Control Officer positions assigned to schools.

Officers have responded to 602 calls for service.

Officers have documented 184 incident reports.

Based on current monthly average the schools are expected to generate over 1,244 calls for service and add nearly 184 incident reports during the calendar school year 2025-2026.






# FAYETTEVILLE <sup>NC</sup> 2024 to 2025 Stops & Searches by Race: Black


