Relationship To Strategic Plan:

Goal III: The City of Fayetteville will be a city invested in today and tomorrow. Objective 3.3: To sustain a favorable development and business climate through timely and accurate construction review and building inspection services.

Executive Summary:

Council is asked to receive a report on statutory amendments adopted by the North Carolina Code Officials Qualification Board (NCCOQB) for all types and levels of building code inspector certifications.

Background:

Effective January 1, 2025, the NCCOQB revised its rules for required qualifications for all levels of building, plumbing, mechanical, electrical and fire inspectors. The occupancy tables for level I, II, and III inspectors, that were previously used have been removed. The new standards limit level I inspectors to only residential construction, level II inspectors to commercial construction, and level III inspectors are unlimited, across all trades.

Issues/Analysis:

Building code inspectors are currently assigned to specific zones of the City. This practice limits the amount of driving across the City and allows for the most efficient use of work hours.

Budget Impact:

The changes could increase the amount of fuel used by inspection staff, and possibly decrease the number of inspections performed per day. Development Services staff will work with Budget Office staff to estimate the annual impact for Council's consideration during the FY26 annual budget process.

Options:

- 1. Accept the report as provided.

What is this?

- § 160D-1103. (Effective January 1, 2025) Qualifications of inspectors.
- No local government shall employ an inspector to enforce the North Carolina State Building Code who does not have one of the following types of certificates issued by the North Carolina Code Officials Qualification Board attesting to the inspector's qualifications to hold such position: (i) a probationary certificate, (ii) a standard certificate, or (iii) a limited certificate which shall be valid only as an authorization to continue in the position held on the date specified in G.S. 143-151.13(c) and which shall become invalid if the inspector does not successfully complete in-service training specified by the Qualification Board within the period specified in G.S. 143-151.13(c). An inspector holding one of the above certificates can be promoted to a position requiring a higher level certificate only upon issuance by the Board of a standard certificate or probationary certificate appropriate for such new position.

After January 1st

With respect to all types of code-enforcement officials newly certified by the Board on or after January 1, 2025, those with Level II, or Level III certificates are qualified to inspect and approve buildings as follows:

- (A) Level I inspectors shall be qualified to perform code-enforcement official duties for residential buildings up to three stories in height with no more than four dwelling units subject to the limitations for the type of inspector.
- (B) Level II inspectors shall be qualified to perform code-enforcement official duties for commercial buildings subject to the limitations for the type of inspector.
- (C) Level III inspectors shall be qualified to perform code-enforcement official duties for any residential or commercial building or structure subject to the limitations for the type of inspector.

Executive Summary:

SFLA Architects have developed a concept master plan for a makerspace on City owned property located on the corner of Murchison/Rowan/Bragg. Concept master plan continues the development of a major gateway in the downtown corridor.

Next step is to evaluate and determine which elements of the project could be completed with the current available appropriated funding. Additionally, requesting proposals to explore potential partners for the management and operations of the proposed facility.

Background:

SFLA Architects were contracted to develop a master plan concept for City owned property on the corner of Murchison/Rowan/Bragg. The focus of the plan was to analyze the potential of repurposing the former Slow Joe Customs buildings into a makerspace.

Makerspaces are communal public workshops in which individuals gather to share resources and knowledge, work on projects, network, and build.

Funding in the amount of \$800,000 was appropriated by City Council on November 8, 2021, for an initial phase of the project. Removal of underground storage tanks, roof replacement, interior demolition, and replacement of security fence have been completed to prepare and secure the property.
