Building Fayetteville's Community Safety System



**The Office of Community Safety is building Fayetteville's coordinated, community-based safety system.**

**OCS is building a coordinated, non-enforcement approach to community safety challenges through:**

- Prevention of violence before it occurs
- Appropriate response to crises
- Connection to services and long-term support
- Strengthening overall community stability



**Fayetteville continues to experience community safety challenges that require coordinated, service-based responses.**

**Many community safety challenges involve:**

- Behavioral health needs
- Housing instability
- Non-violent crisis situations

These situations require coordinated, service-based responses that complement traditional enforcement.

**OCS is building a system designed to:**

- Prevent escalation into violence or crisis
- Respond with the right resource at the right time
- Reduce reliance on enforcement for non-violent situations
- Improve long-term outcomes for residents

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OCS is building a comprehensive safety system across four core service areas:



## Four Pillars of Community Safety

### **Community-Based Violence Prevention**

Prevent and interrupt violence before it occurs

### **Homelessness Response**

Stabilize individuals and connect to housing and services

### **Youth Initiatives**

Engage young people through safe spaces and opportunity

### **Mental Health Response & Diversion**

Develop non-law enforcement responses to crises, including mental health, substance use, and broader behavioral health needs

**OCS is building momentum into Q3 by advancing key implementation efforts:**

- Advancing community-based violence prevention through trainings and capacity building
- Finalizing the hire of a Behavioral Health Response Program Manager
- Completed release and closure of an RFP for Safe Space Activations, advancing toward award and implementation
- Finalizing micro-grant awards to expand community-led solutions
- Establishing SOPs and internal policies to guide coordinated response
- Investing in a Summer Youth Employment Program supporting 140+ young people

***OCS is building the infrastructure for a coordinated, community-based safety system.***

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**Homelessness / Housing Crisis Responses:** Coordinated responses to housing instability, displacement, or risk of homelessness

**Service Referrals & Connections Coordinated:** Direct connections to services requiring coordination beyond basic information

**Conflicts Identified:** Situations with credible risk of dispute or escalation to violence

**Conflicts Interrupted:** Interventions that de-escalated or prevented potential violence

**Youth Engaged:** Unique youth participating in OCS-supported programs or events

**Community Events Supported:** Events where OCS provided coordination, funding, or partnership support

**Active Cross-System Partnerships:** Ongoing collaborations across agencies and organizations supporting coordinated response

***OCS is ensuring all reported outcomes are clearly defined and consistently tracked.***

## Q2 Snapshot:

- Homelessness / Housing Crisis Responses: 244
- Service Referrals & Connections Coordinated: 44
- Conflicts Identified: 6
- Conflicts Interrupted: 4
- Youth Engaged: 130+
- Community Events Supported: 14
- Active Cross-System Partnerships: 11

***These metrics reflect OCS building and operationalizing a coordinated, community-based safety system.***



Within the City's Mental Health Response & Diversion pillar, OCS is building a coordinated behavioral health response system.

OCS is working across City and community partners to strengthen crisis response and expand coordinated, non-enforcement pathways.

**Ongoing collaboration includes:**

- Alliance Health Crisis Collaborative
- Public Health Sequential Intercept Task Force
- LEAD Program

**Focus Areas:**

- Improving coordination and information sharing
- Developing alternative response pathways
- Expanding access to care and stabilization services

***OCS is building the operational foundation for a coordinated, non-enforcement behavioral health response system.***

**Situation:**

Mother and two children exposed to freezing temperatures following eviction

**OCS Response:**

- Coordinated EMS + Community Paramedics
- Activated Child Protective Services
- Secured emergency shelter placement
- Connected to CARES Resource Center + PATH Program

**Outcome:**

- Immediate safety and stabilization
- Entry into long-term support systems

**Why It Matters:**

OCS is building the capacity to respond to behavioral health crises with appropriate care, reducing reliance on enforcement and preventing escalation.

## Building Community-Based Violence Prevention

OCS is building the City's capacity to prevent and interrupt violence through community-based strategies.

### Partnership with PROOVE supports:

- Street outreach
- Conflict mediation
- Youth and family engagement

### Q2 Activity:

- 14 community events (200+ residents engaged)
- 6 conflicts identified
- 4 conflicts interrupted
- 7 individuals connected to services



***Each interruption represents a potential escalation to violence that was prevented through early, community-based intervention.***

## Building Fayetteville's Violence Prevention Framework

OCS is building a coordinated, citywide approach to violence prevention in partnership with NICJR.

Progress to date:

- Completed strategic planning sessions
- Developed initial framework for implementation
- Launched community feedback sessions

***OCS is advancing this work from planning into implementation through community partnerships and coordinated strategy.***

## **Building a Coordinated Response System to Housing Instability**

- OCS is building a coordinated response system to address housing instability and homelessness.

### **Focus areas include:**

- Immediate stabilization
- Connection to shelter and services
- Identification of long-term housing pathways

***OCS is strengthening coordination to ensure consistent, system-level response to housing-related crises.***



**Situation:**

Family displaced by a house fire, resulting in immediate loss of housing, belongings, and basic necessities

**OCS Role:**

- Coordinated with local partners to rapidly mobilize emergency support
- Facilitated connection to temporary shelter and immediate stabilization resources
- Connected family to essential supplies, including clothing, food, and household items
- Supported navigation of recovery services and next-step assistance

**Outcome:**

- Immediate stabilization of the family following displacement
- Access to critical resources to support short-term recovery
- Connection to ongoing support systems to assist with longer-term housing and stability

**Why It Matters:**

OCS is building a system that ensures residents experiencing crisis receive timely, coordinated support.

## **Building Prevention Through Youth Engagement**

OCS is building youth engagement as a core violence prevention strategy.

### **Q2 Highlights:**

- Youth Night Out reached 130+ participants
- Expanded partnerships to increase programming access

### **Impact:**

- Provides safe, structured environments
- Builds connections to opportunity
- Supports long-term community stability
