#### 1.0 CALL TO ORDER

Mayor Colvin called the meeting to order.

#### 2.0 INVOCATION

The invocation was offered by Pastor Rosa Herman, Harvest Family Church.

#### 4.0 ANNOUNCEMENTS AND RECOGNITIONS

Mr. Darrell Allison, Fayetteville State University (FSU) Chancellor, presented an update on NCInnovation, a public-private partnership at FSU. The State of North Carolina created a \$500 million endowment. FSU became the 7th Hub in North Carolina for an industry sector focused on defense innovation. Chancellor Allison announced Dr. Alison Beatty as the NCInnovation Regional Hub Director at FSU. Beatty stated the mission of the NCInnovation Hub is to accelerate the commercialization of technology out of the universities to address market needs and create long-term economic benefits for all regions in the state. NCInnovation supports researchers with grant funding,

mentorship, and partnership development to help accelerate the transition from academia to industry.

Chancellor Allison announced the Pathways and Partnerships Breakfast Series to bring faculty, business, and military innovators together on April 29th at FSU. This will help identify collaborative opportunities and lay the groundwork for funding proposals.

Discussion ensued.

Mayor Colvin stated FSU spoke to the Council after the initial award for the NCInnovation Hub and the City and FSU entered into an agreement for Catalyst Site 1. Chancellor Allison thanked the City for their continued partnership and support. The collaboration reflects a shared commitment to enhancing the quality of life, education opportunities, and economic vitality across the City and makes lasting contributions to the future. Progress continues for the potential land exchange between FSU and the City and creates an alignment of assets that will be leveraged to serve the public good and create long-range planning for the benefit of the Murchison Road community. The FSU Board recently voted to approve the transfer of the FSU Washington Drive property to the City and looks forward to an agreement for the transfer of Catalyst Site 1 to FSU.

#### 8.01 Receive the Stormwater Advisory Board Annual Report

Mr. Byron Reeves, Deputy Public Services Director, introduced Mr. Whitaker Grannis, Stormwater Advisory Board (SWAB) Chair. Mr. Grannis presented the Stormwater Advisory Board Annual Report with the aid of a PowerPoint presentation and stated SWAB has nine members, appointed for two years, who can serve up to two consecutive terms. Meetings are held the first Tuesday of the month at 5:30 p.m. at the FAST Transit Center, 505 Franklin Street.

Mr. Grannis provided a history of SWAB. SWAB serves as the public involvement mechanism for the City's National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) permit. No federal funding is provided for NPDES. The Board also focuses on Capital Improvement Projects, the Drainage Assistance Program, and watershed studies.

The Board plans to focus on reviewing the Impervious Area Analysis and Tiered Rate Structure Study, which is in the process of being completed, and will be identifying rates for businesses and possibly residences; the board will continue to review and approve drainage assistance projects and hear appeals on illicit connections and improper disposal to the storm sewer system.

## 8.02 Receive the Joint Fayetteville-Cumberland County Senior Citizen Advisory Commission Annual Report

Mr. Vann Sherrod, Joint Fayetteville-Cumberland County Citizen Advisory Commission Chair, presented the Joint Fayetteville-Cumberland County Citizen Advisory Commission Annual Report and stated there are six members, five City appointments and one County appointment. The main goals of the Commission are to advocate for senior citizens, assist in providing senior citizens resources, and assist in providing resources, programs, and volunteering opportunities. The Commission is currently looking to identify more resources. Mr. Sherrod stated the Commission has recently hosted an information table at senior citizen events, is planning a luncheon to invite senior organizations to further accomplish gaining resources, created a questionnaire box for senior centers and churches, is working on developing new flyers and brochures, and increasing their presence on Facebook.

#### 9.0 PUBLIC HEARINGS

# 9.01 Public Hearing and Subsequent Adoption of the Substantial Amendments to the Housing and Urban Development 2022-2023 and the 2024-2025 Annual Action Plans

Mr. Albert Baker, Economic & Community Development Assistant Director, presented this item with the aid of a PowerPoint presentation and stated the substantial amendments are for the Housing Opportunities for Persons with Aids (HOPWA) program. HOPWA is the only federal program designed to assist people with HIV and Aids. Individuals must have an HIV or Aids diagnosis, have low-to-moderate

income, and live in Cumberland County, Harnett County, or Hoke County to qualify.

The City Council adopted the 2022 HUD Annual Action Plan, allocating \$200,000.00 for the HOPWA Housing Trust Fund. Similarly, City Council adopted the 2024 HUD Annual Action Plan, allocating \$200,000.00 for the HOPWA Housing Trust Fund. The request is to transfer the 2022 funding to the HOPWA Tenant-Based Rental Assistance Program (TBRA) and the 2024 funding to the HOPWA Housing and Services Program. There has been a significant increase in people served in the TBRA program by almost 60 percent due to rising rent, subsidy payments due to rent waivers, and increased portions paid on behalf of the residents.

This is the advertised public hearing set for this date and time. There being no one to speak, the public hearing was opened and closed.

#### 10.01 Authorize PSAP (911 Center) Architectural Agreement 806

Mayor Colvin stated there has been interest by the City and County to have discussions regarding a joint consolidated 911 system that would consist of the City, County, and surrounding municipalities. The talks are ongoing per the direction of City Council at the March 13, 2025, Council Meeting. Tonight is to create a placeholder so the City can still be considered for a grant if the discussions are not successful.

Mr. Adam Lindsay, Assistant City Manager, presented this item with the aid of a PowerPoint presentation and stated this item was tabled from the March 13, 2025, meeting. The City has been working diligently towards a 911 Center. Currently, there is a competitive state-level construction grant available that the City does not want to miss out on applying for, which could award up to \$9 million.

The request is for Council to consider continuing to table the architectural services agreement, approve the 911 construction grant, and engage professional partners to pursue that while continuing discussions with County partners on consolidation. The cost to engage the architect for the required conceptual floor plan would cost an estimated \$10,000.00.
