

Total Crime Index




Statewide 2.3 percent increase in Crime Index




Traffic Stops

A total of 35,884 traffic stops conducted. Speeding, Careless and Reckless vehicle operations have been a consistent complaint within the community and from Council.



Crimes Against Society

Crimes Against Society encompass crimes such as weapon and drug violations or any other violation of law which the State of North Carolina is the victim.



Criminal Apprehensions

Criminal apprehensions indicate that crime is being detected, violators are being identified and held accountable. Increased arrests are an indicator of positive impact on clearance rates or solvability of crime.






















Total SS Alerts by District


Groups from outside jurisdictions routinely come into the city and steal from “Big Box” stores





Calls for Service / Report Comparison



August 26, 2024 the Fayetteville Police Department assumed control of 49 Cumberland County Schools located within the city limits

Currently have 6 certified SRO's in the schools

Currently have 3 certified SRO's in lateral hiring process to satisfy terms of contract with Cumberland County Schools by January 1, 2025

Currently have 64 Part Time Traffic Control Officer positions filled

Officers have responded to 450 calls for service and taken 98 reports in just over 30 days

Based on current month average the schools are expected to generate over 4,000 calls for service and add nearly 1,000 new crimes during the calendar school year 2024-2025












TSR Data Total Stops 2024




Total Vehicle Stops 3rd Quarter 2024







White Driver Stop to Search Comparison




White Driver Vehicle Search Results






Departmental Staffing






