





### Impact of Federal & State Task Force Officers

- The Fayetteville Police Department has Task Force Officers assigned under DEA, FBI, ATF and the US Marshals.
- Federal resources provided to the City as a result of the Task Force Officers includes assistance with investigations, adoption of local cases, equipment and overtime reimbursement.



### 3<sup>rd</sup> Quarter TFO Activity

- 13 individuals federally sentenced
- 31 individuals federally indicted and pending adjudication
- \$432,124 seized associated with criminal activity
- 33 firearms seized and taken off the street.
- Continue to work with US Attorney Michael Easley Jr. and his Office with Violent Crime Action Plan (VCAP) under Project Safe Neighborhood.



- FususONE is a map-based interface that combines private and public video streams into a single feed, enabling greater situational awareness and a common operating picture.
- Allows privately owned personal security cameras to be registered and to upload video with evidentiary value.
- Allows police to maintain a virtual database and map of all security cameras to identify potential evidence within the vicinity of a crime scene.
- The FPD currently has 36 donor sites and branding of the program will be rolling out this spring. Additionally, we will integrate the Residential Camera Program into the registry of FususOne.
