#### **Executive Summary:**

On November 14, 2022, at a Regular meeting, the City Council approved the creation of a temporary Downtown Social District for 12 months to operate Monday through Saturday from 12 p.m. to 10 p.m. and Sunday from 10 a.m. to 10 p.m. The District was effective on December 1, 2022.

Cool Spring Downtown District, Inc. (CSDD) will present a progress report on the impacts on both downtown businesses and City's Departments. In addition, the City Council will direct Staff to rescind the pilot, continue until December 31st, or create an ordinance amendment for a permanent Social District.

#### Background:

The Board of the CSDD requested City Council's consideration to establish a social district as authorized by legislation enacted by the North Carolina General Assembly in 2021. This was recommended as an Action Item in the Downtown Urban Design Plan adopted by City Council on February 24, 2020, which called for adopting an Entertainment Ordinance to better regulate open containers, amplified sound, retail sidewalk sales, etc., within the Municipal Service District.

Social districts have been implemented in various towns and cities across the state since legislation was enacted, allowing municipalities to designate areas where alcoholic beverages can be purchased from a licensed ABC permittee and then taken outdoors. A social district is a defined outdoor area in which a person may consume alcoholic beverages sold by an ABC permittee. This term does not include the ABC permittee's licensed premises or an extended area allowed under G.S. 18B-904(h). A city may adopt an ordinance designating an area within the municipal limits as a social district under G.S. 160A-205.4. A social district must be maintained in a manner that protects the health and safety of the general public (G.S. 18B-904.1(c)(2)).

#### Issues/Analysis:

Per General Statue, a city designating a social district is required to establish management and maintenance plans for the social district and post these plans, along with a drawing of the boundaries and the applicable days and hours of the social district, on the city's website.

#### **Social District Requirements**

The social district must meet the following requirements under North Carolina law:

- An alcoholic beverage purchased for consumption in the social district must:
  - be consumed in the social district.
  - be disposed of before exiting the social district unless entering a business within the social district that allows alcoholic beverages to be brought inside the business.

#### **ABC Permittee Requirements**

A permittee located and selling alcoholic beverages within the social district must meet the following requirements under North Carolina law:

- The permittee must:
  - o only sell and serve alcoholic beverages on its licensed premises.
  - only sell alcoholic beverages for consumption in a container that meets all of the following requirements:
    - The container clearly identifies the permittee from which the alcoholic beverage was purchased.
    - The container clearly displays a logo or some other mark that is unique to the social district in which it will be consumed.
    - The container is not comprised of glass.
    - The container displays, in no less than 12-point font, the statement,
       "Drink Responsibly Be 21."
    - The container shall not hold more than 16 fluid ounces.

#### **Patron Requirements**

The possession and consumption of an alcoholic beverage in a social district is subject to all of the following requirements of North Carolina law:

- Only alcoholic beverages purchased from a permittee located in the social district may be possessed and consumed.
- Alcoholic beverages must:
  - o only be in designated social district containers.
  - only be possessed and consumed during the days and hours set by the City:
- A single patron cannot be sold or delivered alcoholic beverage drinks in excess of:
  - Not more than two alcoholic beverage drinks at one time if any of the following:
    - A malt beverage, unfortified wine, fortified wine.
    - Not more than one alcoholic beverage at one time if an alcoholic beverage drink is a mixed beverage or contains spirituous liquor.
- A person must dispose of any alcoholic beverage before exiting the social district unless entering a business within the social district that allows alcoholic beverages to be brought inside the business.

#### **Budget Impact:**

The impact to the City's budget has been negligible as Solid Waste, Parks, Recreation and Maintenance, and the Fayetteville Police Department have reported little to no discernable impact from the Social District.

#### **Options:**


- 1. Continue the Social District pilot until December 31st;
- 2. Direct staff to create an ordinance amendment for a permanent Social District; or
- 3. Direct staff to rescind the Social District pilot at a Regular Meeting in August.

#### Recommended Action:

Staff recommends that City Council move for consensus allowing for the continuation of the Social District pilot program to December 31st, 2023.

### Social District Timeline

- April December 2020: Council positioned policies to support expanded outdoor dining and merchandising during COVID.
- September November 2021: HB 890 passes, Cool Spring Downtown District's (CSDD) Board of Directors receives an overview presentation. Board agrees to explore further.
- March 2022: CSDD hosts ZOOM meeting with State-wide professional associations. More than 60 businesses and residents attended the event.
- July 2022: CSDD and the Economic and Community Development Department meet to develop proposed boundaries for Council consideration.
- August 2022: CSDD releases a survey to downtown stakeholders and the public at large
- September 2022: CSDD attends City Council Work Session, Council directs staff to proceed
- November 14 and 28, 2022: City Council conducts Public Hearings to implement
- December 1, 2022: City and CSDD implement Social District policies and branding
- June 5, 2023: Council requested update at the 6 month mark



### **Social District Basics**

#### What is a Social District?

A defined outdoor area in which a person may consume alcoholic beverages sold by an ABC permittee. This term does not include the ABC permittee's licensed premises, or an extended area allowed under G.S. 18B-904(h).

- •Purchase your alcohol beverages from one of the participating restaurants/breweries located within the Cool Sprint Downtown District.
- •You will be given a specially designed cup that can be used only in the social district's boundary lines (see our Social District map).
- •Experience the Vibe of the Social District as you shop our downtown merchant community.
- •Dispose of your designated social district cup into any of the trash cans located in Downtown Fayetteville.

#### **Executive Summary:**

The proposed text amendment below represents a suggested update to the City's Code of Ordinances, Chapter 14, as proposed by the City Council and recommended by the City's Planning Commission.

File Number: 23-3371

On February 21, 2023, the Planning Commission held a Legislative Public Hearing regarding this text amendment. The Commission voted to recommend approval. On March 23, 2023, this text amendment was placed on the agenda for consideration by the City Council. The City Council asked that it return for their discussion at a Work Session.

#### Background:

This amendment was requested by the City Council at their Work Session on February 6, 2023. While the Planning Staff was presenting its list of Seasonal Text Amendments, members of the Council brought up their concerns regarding the boarding of commercial buildings in Fayetteville. At their request, staff has put together a proposed code amendment to handle the boarding of commercial buildings in the same manner as residential structures.

Current city code addresses only residential buildings. Since 2015, Code Enforcement has managed 535 Boarded Building cases of which 39 remain open. Code Enforcement has identified 32 boarded commercial buildings in the city at this time.

Peer cities and Cumberland County were asked for information regarding registration of boarded buildings. Of the eleven peers, only two require registration of residential buildings and those two only permit the boarding to be in place for six months. A third peer city requires Code Administrator approval prior to boarding any building.

#### Issues/Analysis:

Proposed code amendment:

TA23-019: <u>Boarding of Commercial Buildings</u>, This amendment is to amend chapter 14, Article VI. by adding regulations governing the registration of residential and commercial boarded-up structures in order to prevent their detrimental effects in the city's neighborhoods.

The Code is proposed to be amended by changing the term "Residential Structure" to "Structure" throughout this section of the code. As well as amending the definition of Residential Structure to Structure in Article VI of Chapter 14. The new ordinance would regulate all structures as defined below:

"Structure - anything constructed or erected, the use of which requires location on the land, or attachment to or something having a permanent location on the land. The term "structure" shall be construed as if followed by the words, "or part thereof".

The attached ordinance gives the recommended specific langue changes.

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF FAYETTEVILLE AMENDING ARTICLE VI, REGULATION OF BOARDED UP RESIDENTIAL STRUCTURES, OF CHAPTER 14, THE UNIFIED DEVELOPMENT ORDINANCE, OF THE CODE OF ORDINANCES OF THE CITY OF FAYETTEVILLE, NORTH CAROLINA

BE IT ORDAINED, by the City Council of the City of Fayetteville, North Carolina, that:

Article VI, regulation of boarded up residential structures, of chapter 14, is amended by deleting the same in its entirety and substituting the following:

#### **Article VI. - Regulation of Boarded Up Structures**

#### Sec. 14-121. Purpose and Authority.

- a. It is the purpose of this article to promote the health, safety and welfare of the citizens and preserve the dignity and peace of the city by establishing regulations governing boarded up <u>structures</u> in order to prevent their detrimental effects in the city's neighborhoods.
- b. The <u>department</u> shall be responsible for the administration and enforcement of the provisions of this article and shall have the following authority:
  - 1. To inspect the properties;
  - 2. To obtain administrative search and inspection warrants, if necessary, as provided in <u>G.S. 15-27.2</u>; and
  - 3. To issue notices of violation and impose civil penalties.

#### Sec. 14-122. Definitions.

The following words, terms and phrases, when used in this article, shall have the meaning ascribed to them in this section, except where the context clearly indicates a different meaning:

**Board Up** means the boarding up of any means of egress and ingress, including, without limitation, windows and doors that are clearly visible from the public right-of-way, to an <u>unoccupied structure</u>.

**Department** means the development services department, <u>housing</u> and code enforcement division. With respect to the department, the development services director may delegate any of the functions or powers of the department under this article to such officers and agents as he may designate.

**Owner** means the holder of title in fee simple and includes the owner's duly authorized agent or attorney.

**Structure** means anything constructed or erected, the use of which requires location on the land, or attachment to or something having a permanent location on the land. The term "structure" shall be construed as if followed by the words, "or part thereof"

**Unoccupied** means a <u>structure</u> that is not occupied or that is occupied by unauthorized persons. In the case of a multi-unit residential structure, unoccupied means when any one unit is unoccupied or occupied by unauthorized persons.

#### Sec. 14-123. Registration.

- a. No <u>owner</u> shall board up a <u>structure</u> without registering the <u>structure</u> with the <u>department</u> no later than 48 hours after boarding it up. Failure to register the structure within 48 hours after boarding it up will subject the owner to civil penalty as set forth in section 14-127 of this article.
- b. The owner of the boarded up structure must submit an application for registration to the department on a form prescribed by the department within 48 hours of boarding it up. The completed registration form shall contain the following information:
  - 1. The full name and mailing address of the owner;
  - 2. The full address and tax parcel number of the structure to be boarded;
  - 3. An accurate telephone number where the owner may be reached;
  - 4. If the owner is a partnership or corporation, the owner shall designate one of its general partners or officers to act as its agent and provide the present residence and business addresses and telephone numbers for the agent;
  - 5. The owner's plan for the occupancy, repair or demolition of the structure;
  - 6. The owner's plan for regular maintenance during the period the structure is boarded up; and
  - 7. Such other information as the department shall from time to time deem necessary.
- c. The owner, under this section, shall have a continuing duty to promptly supplement registration information required by this section in the event that said information changes in any way from what is stated on the original registration.
- d. Registration of a boarded up structure does not excuse the owner from compliance with any other applicable ordinance, regulation, or statute, without limitation, including <a href="Chapter 14">Chapter 14</a>. By accepting an owner's registration, the department has not determined that the structure being registered is in compliance with any applicable local or state regulation or law.

#### Sec. 14-124. Time Limit.

a. An <u>owner</u> who registers a boarded up <u>structure</u> pursuant to section <u>14-123</u> of this article shall comply with section <u>14-39(i)</u> of the Fayetteville Code of Ordinances and any

- guidelines for boarding up structures as shall be established by the <u>department</u> from time to time.
- b. An owner's registration of a boarded up structure shall expire three years from the date of registration with the department. Upon notification from the department of expiration of registration an owner shall, within 60 days of such notification, remove all boarding from doors and windows. Doors and windows may be covered with at least one-half inch thick transparent shatter-proof acrylic material, in compliance with section 14-39(j). Doors and windows shall be free of any defects prior to covering.

#### Sec. 14-125. Compliance Period for Existing Structures.

An <u>owner</u> who owns a boarded up <u>structure</u> prior to the effective date of this article shall register the <u>structure</u> with the <u>department</u> in compliance with section <u>14-123</u> of this article within 30 days of the effective date of this article. The registration shall be effective for three years following the date of registration. An owner who fails to register the structure within 30 days of the effective date of this article shall be in violation of this article and shall be subject to civil penalty as described in section <u>14-127</u> of this article.

#### Sec. 14-127. Notice of Violation; Penalties.

Except as otherwise specified in this article, the <u>department</u> shall notify the <u>owner</u> of a boarded up <u>structure</u> of a violation of this article and the owner shall have ten business days from the date of the notice of violation to abate the violation. Failure to abate the violation shall subject the owner to a civil penalty in accordance with the fee and penalty schedule as approved by city council until the violation is abated. The civil penalty may be recovered in the nature of a debt in accordance with North Carolina law.

#### Sec. 14-128. Notices.

Any notice required to be given by the <u>department</u> under this article to the <u>owner</u> shall be given either by personal delivery to the owner or by first class United States mail to the most current address listed in the registration that has been received by the department. In the event an owner has failed to register with the department any required notice may be sent to the address listed for the responsible person in the county property tax records. Notices shall be deemed given upon their deposit in the United States mail and shall be deemed to have been received on the third regular postal delivery day thereafter.

#### Sec. 14-129. Appeal of Civil Penalties.

An <u>owner</u> who has been assessed a civil penalty for a violation of this article may request an appeal hearing in accordance with section <u>1-9</u> of the Fayetteville Code of Ordinances.

# Overview

### Council Requested Text Amendment

- A requested update to the City's Code of Ordinances, Chapter 14, as proposed by the City Council and recommended by the City's Planning Commission.
- On February 6, 2023, City Council requested staff to bring a text amendment adding Commercial Buildings to the Boarded Building Registration standards.
- On February 21, 2023, Planning Commission held a Legislative Public Hearing regarding this text amendment. The Commission voted to recommend approval.
- On March 23, 2023, text amendment was placed on agenda for action. City Council decided to send their item to a Work Session.



<u>Directive of February 6, 2023</u>: Offer to City Council a way to apply the Residential Boarded Building Registration Standards to Non-Residential Structures.

<u>Recommendation</u>: Amend Chapter 14 Article 6 to address the boarding of residential and commercial structures.

<u>Purpose</u>: Prevent the potential detrimental affects of boarded buildings throughout the City.



# **Current Ordinance Code Key Points**

- Standards only enforced on Residential Structures.
- •Requires Registration of boarded structure within forty eight hours of being boarded.
- •Limits time structure can be boarded to a maximum of three years.
- •After three years, owner must remove boards within sixty days of notification.
- •Failure to register or comply with removal of boards would result in the issuance of a civil penalty.
- Boarded building registrations do not prevent city from taking actions for dangerous conditions, blighted conditions or substandard conditions.



#### Good morning Mr. Hewett,

I want to follow up with a meeting I had with Councilman Benavente. As you know, we started providing domestic violence (DV) services a few years ago. Let me share the background of how that happened. In the 70's Cape Fear Valley Health System and the Fayetteville Police Department realized that there was a lack of services for victims of sexual violence. That is when our organization started. Also, in the 70's DV services were set up through the department of social services. For decades, we provided services to only victims of sexual violence. But as we all know, often sexual and domestic violence go hand-in-hand. At no fault of DSS, often victims would not want to reach out to DSS and go into the "system" for fear that their children would be taken away because of violence in the home. In 2019, then Judge Robert Stiehl, who was the head of our DV task force team said that the state of North Carolina was bringing e-filing of DVPO's throughout the state. He asked if there was an agency that would be willing to provide e-filing services to victims. The concept was so that the DVPO's were done outside of the courthouse in order for victims to receive advocacy, support, and resources. For whatever reason DSS decided not to be involved. We thought it was so important for the community to provide the services that we agreed to take it on. Victims are told about our services in a variety of different ways, through law enforcement, the magistrates office, or other collaborative agencies. Victims come into our office, which is a warm and supportive atmosphere, where they can bring their children, friends, other family members, fill out the paperwork for a DVPO and video chat with a judge. We also do safety planning with them which can be very intense, we provide resources, to include shelter. We ask if they need medical treatment, if they would like to file a police report, and depending on their circumstances, a host of other needs we address. We also offer to have an advocate go with them for their court date, which is typically 10 days after they leave our office. The judicial system can be very scary, confusing, overwhelming and an intimidating place.

In February of this year Chief Braden asked us to help further address the domestic violence issues we are having in our community. Chief Braden asked us to make calls to all the people that Fayetteville Police Dept receives calls for services from. It is our hope that by making these calls we can inform victims of resources available to them to 'help break the cycle'. Although officers do have information with them at the time that they respond, it can be an intense, traumatic, chaotic situation for victims and they often do not comprehend services available. Which is why he asked us to make follow-up calls. We receive a list on Monday and Thursday. We have committed to make follow up calls no later than 24 hours after we received the list. We have had much success. Victims have come to our office to receive help, we have e-filed DVPO's with them. Oftentimes when victims feel that they're in a safe place they tend to tell their story. On multiple, multiple occasions we have called FPD for a detective to be assigned to look into specific cases, because when people feel that they are safer, and that there's help available, they feel more confident in telling their story to law enforcement and ask for help.

Cumberland County has one DV shelter that is run by DSS. It has eight beds. Not nearly enough. They often do not have availability when we call. So, then we're stuck. We do call surrounding counties to see if they have availability. But if the victim has children, it is prohibitive to leave the county and be so far away and get the children back-and-forth from school, to get back-and-forth from work, so more often than not victims have no other choice than to go back to the home or the violence happened.

Domestic violence, sexual violence, and human trafficking is very complex with layers and layers of issues and problems that we have to help them overcome. But if we cannot provide basic services such as a roof over their head, then we cannot expect them to be able to leave a violent situation, and so the numbers will continue to grow
