3rd Quarter TFO Activity

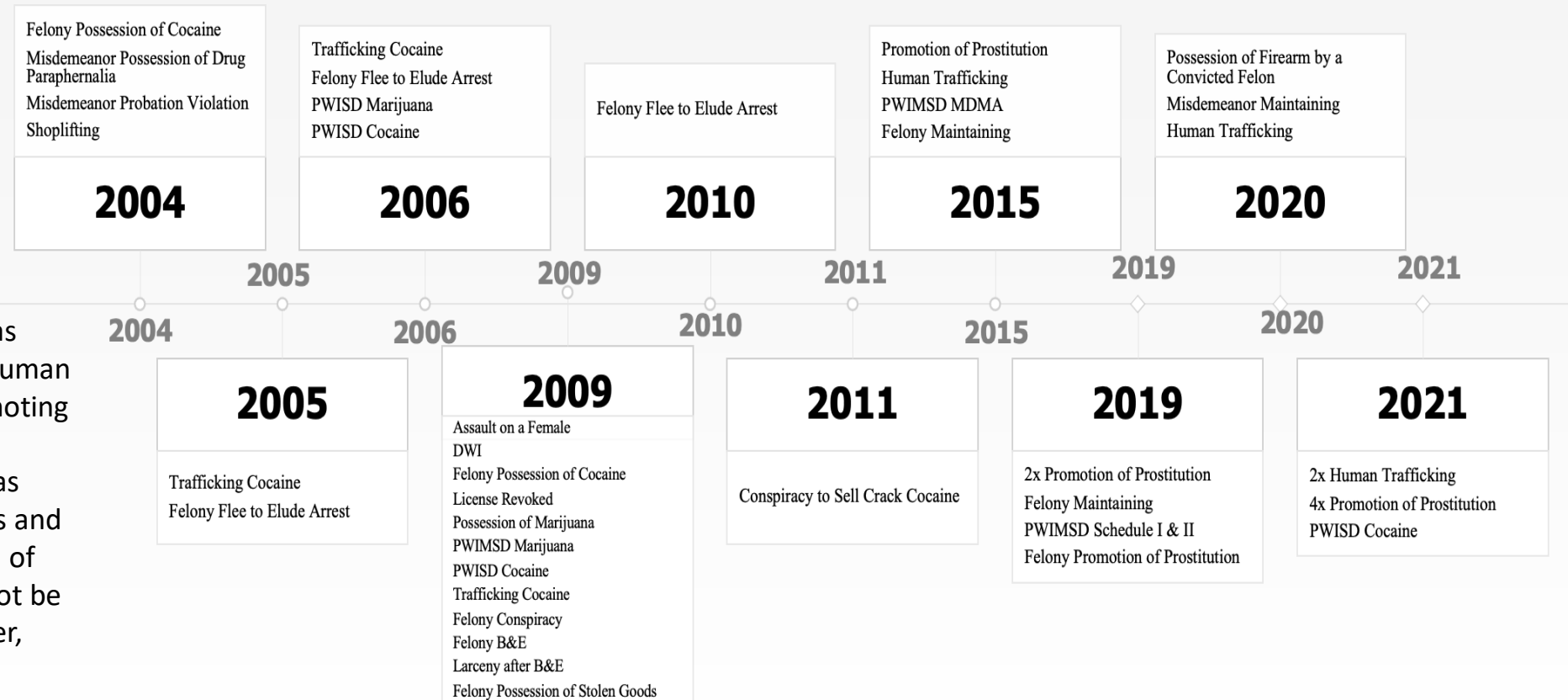
- 6 individuals federally sentenced

Markus Odom McCormick Conviction Community Impact



On July 2, 2021, McCormick was found guilty of two counts of human trafficking, four counts of promoting prostitution, and one count of PWISD cocaine. McCormick was sentenced to between 23 years and 43 years in the NC Department of Corrections. McCormick will not be eligible for release until October, 2045.

Violent offenses such as Murder & Aggravated Assault have shown increase while likelihood of incarceration awaiting trial has decreased

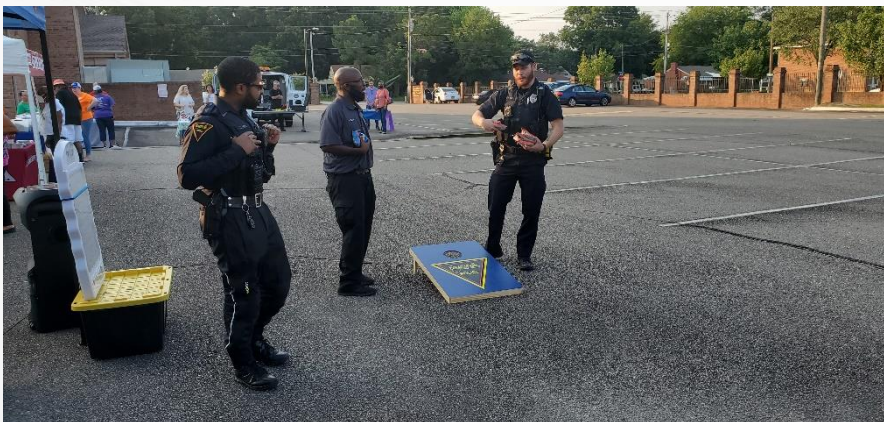
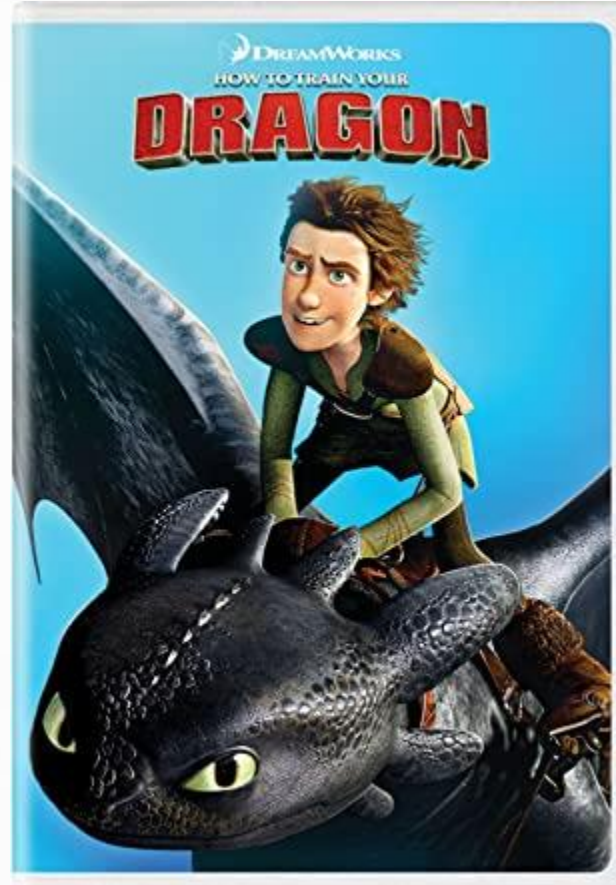

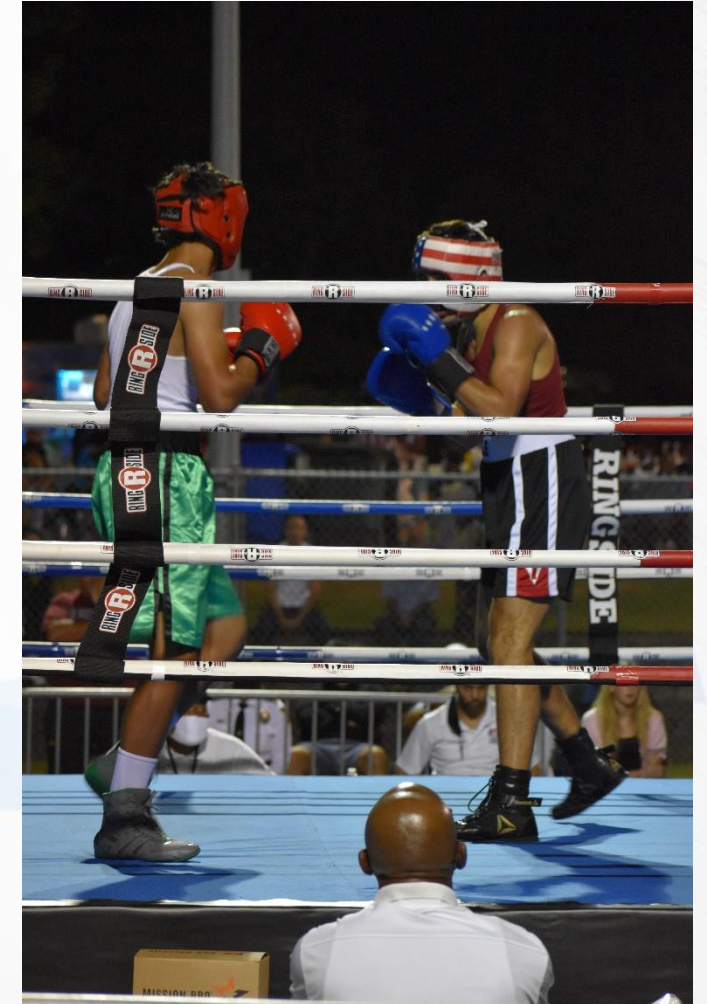


Governor's Crime Commission Grant was utilized to provide 400 Intruder Door Defense to Cumberland County Schools on September 9th, 2021.
